ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Students enrolled in AP courses take the AP exam to potentially earn college credit while in high school.

Individual colleges and universities grant college credit when students pass the AP exam

Taught onsite by high school teachers using a curriculum approved by College Board.

Accepted throughout the nation. Requires a score of 3 or higher on AP exam. Contact individual college/university for their AP policy.

DUAL CREDIT

Dual Credit students can simultaneously earn high school and college credit by successfully completing El Paso Community College (EPCC) courses.

College credit is awarded when the student successfully completes the course.

Taught onsite (or at CCTE for articulated course credit) by high school teachers who serve as adjunct professors with EPCC. Can also be taught online or at EPCC by EPCC instructors.

Accepted at public colleges and universities in Texas, and many private institutions. Check with individual college/university for academic requirements.

IB

Students choose courses from higher level (HL) or standard level (SL) in language and literature; language acquisition; individuals and societies; sciences; math; and the arts.

Students may earn credit for IB courses, but the amount of credit varies. Some colleges award college credit to students who hold a full IB diploma; others may award credit for individual exams.

Taught onsite by high school teachers using a curriculum approved by IBO.

The amount of credit accepted varies. Some colleges award college credit to students who hold a full IB diploma; others may award credit for individual exams

DUAL ENROLLMENT (ONRAMPS & NEEL)

OnRamps students take courses designed by UT Austin. National Education Equity Lab (NEEL) students take courses designed by various universities. Students complete a specialized, college-level curriculum in addition to their regular high school work

College credit is awarded when the student successfully completes the course and formally accepts the credit. Transcript fees vary.

Taught onsite by high school teachers trained by, and in collaboration with, university faculty.

Accepted at public colleges and universities in and/or out of Texas, and many private institutions. Check with individual college/university for academic requirements.
