What is a State Endorsement?

- A state endorsement is a plan of study that students follow to provide a more goal oriented high school experience.
- Think of it as a degree plan in high school.
- The selection of the plan happens in 8th grade but can be changed during 9th grade (it is strongly discouraged to change the plan after 9th grade due to course sequencing).
 - Course sequencing refers to the order of classes that must be taken to fulfill the designated endorsement plan.
 - Each plan has a unique set of courses and sequence in which the course must be taken. This helps prepare students for subsequent courses.
- Students are not limited to one endorsement
- Endorsements show on the high school transcript and are looked at by universities.
- Endorsements show that the student participated in specialized courses and planned for their future
- Endorsements are a GOLD STAR on TRANSCRIPTS





EPHS Will Help ALL Students Achieve a CCMR Point ...

One or more supports can be combined to achieve one or more CCMR points...

- 1. TSI Prep and Testing- free at EPHS and can be challenged starting in 8th grade
- 2. College English Course- a student can be scheduled into the course and if requirements are met, they can achieve a CCMR point-12th grade only
- College Math Course- a student can be scheduled into the course and if requirements are met, they can achieve a CCMR point-12th grade only
- 4. Military- EPHS counselors can help connect students to a recruiter for the branch of their choice
- 5. Earned College Career Technology Certification- starting in 11th grade a student can apply or sign up for a program at our sister campus CCTE. Completion of a program can result in a certification.
- 6. Complete IEP and workforce readiness
- 7. Advanced Course Scheduling- see next slide

What does AP mean? PAP? Dual Credit? UT On Ramps?

(PAP) Pre Advanced Placement-

- Supports students who are interested in taking advanced courses
- Open to all students- NO Entrance TEST Required

(AP) - Advanced Placement

Follows standards set by College Board

- SAT/ PSAT/ AP falls under College Board
- College credit may earned by passing AP exam with a 3,4,or 5
- Open to all students- NO Entrance TEST Required

2 major premises set by College Board

- Expectation-students can perform well at rigorous academic levels
- Opportunity to engage in a higher level of learning and critical thinking.

(DC) Dual Credit

- College Courses at EPHS through El Paso Community College
- Grade posts to college and high school transcript
- Requires TSI test

OnRamps- University of Texas at Austin Courses at EPHS

- Provides students with the opportunity to take UT courses structured by a UT professor with support from EPHS staff
- Students can choose to take the College credit.
- Open to all students- NO Entrance TEST Required

Course Selections for 2023

Beginning in October...

- •Students are meeting one on one with counselors through English or Social Studies courses.
- •Please review and sign the card.
- •Students must return signed copy to English or Social Studies teacher or counselor.

Additional Notes:

- •Courses requested during student-counselor meeting will not be changed at the beginning of the school year.
- •Courses requested are not guaranteed due to limited availability.

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IMPORTANT REMINDERS

- Remember to support your student every day.
- Create mindful habits for studying.
- Teach accountability for managing academics and extracurricular activities.
- Teach communication and advocacy.
- Create opportunities for reflection and perseverance.
- Encourage your student daily.
- Remember that "failures" are only losses when they are not used as an opportunity to grow.
- A straight "A" grade is not everything.
- Develop habits for self-monitoring and parent-student monitoring of academic progress.
- Remember that school is an opportunity for learning and growth in more areas than just academics.
- Be mindful of the "whole" student/self.
- Make opportunity for outside involvement: community service, clubs, fine arts, etc.

College Admissions Timeline

9th Grade Fall

Create a four-year high school plan taking into consideration student goals and ambitions.

- Look at college admission requirements for ideal colleges. It's never early to plan.
- Begin discussing future career options.
- Get involved in extra curricular activities have a balance (one athletic, one academic.)
- Visit your CCMR Coordinator
- Go to https://jlvcollegecounseling.com for scholarship opportunities

9th Grade Spring Semester

- Meet with school counselor to discuss 10th grade course options.
- Adjust four-year high school plan as needed to reflect change in goals.
- Maintain involvement in extra-curricular activities.
- Prepare for End of Course Exam(s). (This is required for graduation.)
- Begin Academic Resume
- Create your Raise Me account on https://www.raise.me/. This website will match you with colleges that you can be a good fit for. They will also offer you mini scholarships for all your academic and extracurricular activities that you have accomplished . You update this yearly.

College Admissions Timeline

10th Grade Fall Semester

- Modify four-year plan to reflect new goals.
- Ensure you are taking rigorous classes to prepare a strong academic resume for college admissions.
- Take PSAT seriously in order to begin preparing for Junior PSAT and ACT/SAT.
- Continue involvement in extracurricular activities and begin taking leadership roles. Update your Raise Me account or create one if you have not. https://www.raise.me/
- Utilize https://jlvcollegecounseling.com for scholarship opportunties

10th Grade Spring Semester

- Meet with counselor to begin planning rigorous junior year curriculum.
- Consider CCTE courses as an option for electives.
- Attend college and career fairs to begin exploring college admissions requirements.
- Tour college campuses as apart of family travel.
- Run for leadership positions with clubs and organizations.
- Update your Academic Resume

College Admissions Timeline

11th Grade Fall Semester

- Update your Raise Me account if you have not from what you accomplished your 10th grade year.
- Study for the upcoming PSAT/NMSQT in October. You want to try to be recognized as a National Merit Semifinalist.
- Continue to research colleges that you would like to attend. Make a spreadsheet of the criteria to be admitted.
- Apply to scholarships utilizing the https://jlvcollegecounseling.com/scholarships/ website
- Take the ASVAB if you are needing guidance on career exploration
- 11th Grade Spring Semester
- If you rank top 10% of your class, apply for the College Prep Scholars Program from Quest Bridge. The application opens in February.
- Study for the upcoming school day SAT that takes place in March. Have a score in mind that you are needing to reach from your college searches, so that you know if you will need to register for other upcoming SAT tests or not. Fee waivers are available for students who are identified economically disadvantaged.
- Start visiting colleges and/or talking to military recruiters
- Have a student resume ready to go for the fall of your senior year so that you may use it for your college applications and to give to those who are writing recommendation letters for you.
- Look for summer internships

College Admission Timeline

12th Grade Fall Semester

- · Visit with your CCMR Coordinator: Mrs. Simpson
- · If you still need to take the SAT, start studying for October's school day SAT test.
- Narrow your college choices and make a spreadsheet that will guide you with college application due dates and items needed. For example: Recommendation letters, essays
- Start gathering recommendation letters. Have your student resume ready to give to those who are writing letters for you.
- Start applying to colleges. Apply TX and Common App open up in August. Also look at housing if you are planning to leave and submit needed application.
- Start working on your college essays.
- Create an account with Going Merry www.goingmerry.com to stay updated with local, district, and national scholarships.
- Continue to visit https://jlvcollegecounseling.com/scholarships/ for more scholarship opportunities
- Update your Raise Me account
- Create your FSA ID and have your parents create their FSA ID before October 1st.
- Do your FAFSA application or TASFA application on Oct.1st or within the month. You will need your FSA ID and income tax of you and your parents. The Income tax that will be needed is the one of the two previous years. For example: Seniors this year will need the 2020 Income Tax for fall of 2022 Spring of 2023.

12th Grade Spring semester

- Be looking out for your admission and financial aid letters.
- Continue to work on scholarships. They make a difference.
- Start discussing options with your parents or guardian.
- Be ready to accept your admission to your school on or before May 1st. May 1st is the most common acceptance due date.

If you are enlisting, have your enlistment papers with your financial award letter ready to submit to your academic counselor.
